Dear Deputy Minister Mr. Rasio Ridho Sani,

I am writing on behalf of Climate Rights International, an international NGO that conducts research and advocacy on the intersection between human rights, environmental degradation, and the climate crisis. We understand that the Ministry of Environment has been asked to investigate environmental pollution caused by the Indonesia Weda Bay Industrial Park (IWIP) by Commission XII of the Indonesian House of Representatives.

Climate Rights International urges the Ministry of Environment to:

- Conduct a full, independent, and transparent investigation into the impacts of IWIP on the environment and on the safety, health, and rights of communities near IWIP, including Lelilef, Gemaf, and Sagea, and make the results of the investigation publicly available and accessible, including in local languages;
- Make all air and water quality information, including information provided to the Ministry by mining and smelting companies, publicly available and accessible, including in local languages;
- Monitor the environmental and human rights impacts of nickel mining and processing on the natural environment, including impacts on forests and fresh and saltwater resources and fine those responsible for such impacts;
- Revoke the licenses of mining companies that fail to prevent serious impacts of miningrelated deforestation on the environment, including fresh and groundwater pollution and erosion, in cases where companies fail to mitigate pollution and other serious impacts; and
- Work with regional authorities and all related government agencies to ensure that
 mining companies are fully compliant with environmental laws and regulations and
 respect the human rights of affected communities, as laid down in both Indonesian and
 international law.

For more than two years, Climate Rights International has monitored and reported on the human rights and environmental impacts of the Indonesia Weda Bay Industrial Park. In January 2024, we published a 124-page report, "Nickel Unearthed: The Human Rights and Climate Costs

of Indonesia's Nickel Industry," based on roughly 45 interviews with community members from Central and East Halmahera.

Our research finds that nickel mining in Central and East Halmahera, North Maluku and nickel smelting at IWIP are threatening the rights, lives, and livelihoods of local people, harming the environment, and contributing to the climate crisis due to deforestation and reliance of captive coal. Community members told Climate Rights International that their lands have been illegally taken by nickel companies, they were not able to fairly negotiate land sales, and Indigenous Peoples have been denied their legal right to Free, Prior, and Informed Consent (FPIC). In addition, pollution from industrial activities is threatening critical freshwater resources and the ecosystems that people depend on for their traditional livelihoods. Despite claims that nickel from this project is needed to power the electric vehicle transition, massive deforestation for nickel mining and coal use at IWIP are directly contributing to the climate crisis. We shared advance notice of this report with the former Ministry of Environment and Forestry, as well as other relevant ministries, but the Ministry of Environment and Forestry did not respond to our inquiries.
